

The first-ever graduating class to go K-12 in Hardin Valley

The first class in the community's history to be entirely "Hardin Valley educated" has just graduated. Zachary Kuban and Ethan Rome are two members of that Hardin Valley Academy Class of 2025 who received a kindergarten-through-high school education without leaving the Valley. "It's definitely exciting for Zach to

be a part of the first-ever graduating class to go K-12 in Hardin Valley," said Kuban's mother, Jordan Kuban, about her son attending Hardin Valley Elementary School and Hardin Valley Middle School before HVA. "He's had an awesome experience as a Hawk."

"Ethan and Zach have had the opportunity to be in class together many times over the past 13 years," said Rome's mom, Jaime Rome. "Their love for track and running relays together has helped to expand their friendship as well.

"Ethan has been a proud Hawk all (13) years," she added. "Ethan and Zachary have built a wide network of friends who take care of each other. Having all three schools close by helps nurture the community feeling among Hardin Valley families.

"The sense of community these students feel with being able to go to Hardin Valley schools throughout their years can't be beat."

"I'm very happy to be in the Hardin Valley schools for so long because I've made a lot of friends through that," Rome said. "Because people come in from Cedar Bluff or somewhere that don't have high schools to go to in their community."

"It's pretty cool that I've gone to the same place for the last 13 years," Kuban said about the three schools being adjacent to each other.

Early years

Thinking back to kindergarten when the boys first met, Kuban said with a big smile, "I kind of remember that Ethan was a little bit of a trouble-maker."

"Well, I can't really deny it at all because I'm pretty sure I was one of the first people to go to the principal's offices in kindergarten," Rome said, also smiling. "But I've definitely gotten better."

As for how these two hit it off early on, "when you made a lot of your friends, it was in class and on the playground," Rome said.

"He's just a nice kid, really," Rome added about Kuban. "He's just someone that you want to surround yourself with."

Track and fields ties

Their love of track and field dates back to elementary school and has continued at HVA, being the main connection point for the senior pair.

"We've been running track since, like, the fourth grade," said Rome, whose specialties are the 100, 200- and 400-meter dashes at HVA.

"We've been running track together for a while, and so we probably have developed a lot of getting to know each other better through that," said Kuban, a 100- and 200-meter sprinter. "And Ethan's definitely a natural leader — people want to listen to him and follow him because he's, you know, just really responsible at track and stuff like that."

"Ethan's definitely a lot more of a natural leader than I am," he added. "I guess I tend to be more quiet and reserved."

Rome's also there to help. "When there's a new kid at track, he the one who will go and talk to him and show him our drills and stuff," Kuban said.

"Ethan always takes time for everybody and he knows everybody on the team. That's really cool. So I've definitely taken that from him and learned how to be a leader at track from him."

Kuban's putting into practice what he's learned.

"We're both trying to be leaders on the track team this year because we're both seniors," he said. "That's definitely an opportunity to let people look up to us and learn from us. So we both probably have that same goal in mind."

One of their senior goals has been reached — times two: Rome and Kuban are both legs on the Hawks' state qualifying 4 X 200 and 4 X 100 relay teams performing in Murfreesboro in the Division 1-AAA state meet Thursday, May 22. The 4 X 100 team, in fact, was Sectional champions.

In terms of helping each other get better, "It's a lot easier to take, not criticism, but constructive criticism," Rome said, "Because you can't see how you're running, so it's a lot easier for somebody else to tell you 'hey, this is what you need to work on."

"Zach's a lot better at the start (of a race) than me," he added. "And I'm still trying to pick it up. And he's very natural when it comes to that."

"If I'm better at the start, Ethan's definitely better (later in the race) because, being a 400 runner, he has that endurance and he's really good at holding his running form, so he helps me with that, too," Kuban said. "And, yeah, that's just kind of a cool thing with track. We all watch each other run and help each other out."

A key strong point

But Rome pointed to an even more important Kuban quality. "He's been

very involved in the church," Rome said of Kuban, as these friends attend different Christian denomination churches. "You kind of want to surround yourself with those kind of people.

"I'm trying to learn to grow in that way, and I think he's done a great job at it," he added about Kuban.

Looking ahead

On the academic front, "We both are in the National Honors Society," said Kuban, who is in the STEM Academy at HVA. "I started doing engineering classes here because I want to be an aerospace engineer after college.

"But eventually, I switched to the early college experience pathway, and that's something that's kind of unique to Hardin Valley, but it's where we can go to Pellissippi State down the road and get college classes done, which is really nice," he added. "And I'll go to college with a lot of my (general education) classes done."

"Zachary, with his early college experience, he will go to college with something like 36 credit hours already because he's been doing dual enrollment his junior year and senior year," said Ashli Beeler, HVA's academy coach. "He spends the majority of his day off campus at Pellissippi."

As for Rome, "I started in the Health Science Academy," he said. "... I started taking classes for cardiovascular services and I'm in a clinicals class where I get to go to different sites and shadow. Right now I'm in a rehab clinic, and it's a lot of fun.

"They're letting me do stuff that's hands on and it's giving me more experience basically to figure out what I want to do when I'm older," Rome added. "I'll probably major in something like pre med because, I mean, I'm just trying to go into healthcare. It's kind of hard to pinpoint exactly where, but in my mind it has to have something to do with patients — I'm a big fan of patient care."

"He's in his clinicals now, which means he's actually doing similar to like rotations where he's out working in the field," Beeler said about Rome. "That's ultimately our goal: for more kids to get to that point, doing more work-based learning or real world-type experience while they're in high school."

While their next educational stop is a gigantic campus, Rome and Kuban will remain together in a manner of speaking: both plan to attend the University of Tennessee, Knoxville.

'My Charlie'

HVA teen is a source of much praise from his girlfriend, her mom and so many more as he is memorialized in giving



 \mathbf{F} orget about parents skeptical of their teenage daughter's boyfriend: Charlie Schuster couldn't have been more popular with mom and daughter in the Hungate household.

Almost five months after this beloved 16-year-old sophomore at Hardin Valley Academy was killed in a vehicular accident Jan. 3, the memory of Charlie lives on through a church, a golf event and maybe a roadway.

And through the kind words of Tabatha and Lily Hungate, among so many others.

"As Lily's mother, I would just like to say that Charlie was the type of young man that any mother could only hope that their daughter would choose to spend time with," Tabatha Hungate said. "He was hardworking, kind and he treated Lily like a princess."

"My Charlie was so kind and always thoughtful; he was an amazing boyfriend to me and I'll always love him," said Lily, a fellow HVA sophomore. "I hope everyone can learn something from Charlie's kindness. If we could all do that, the world would be a better place."

Reaching out

"He would reach out to new students and stuff like that just to make them feel comfortable because he was a new student once at Hardin Valley" coming from Maryville to begin the seventh grade at Hardin Valley Middle School — "so he knew how it felt," said Jimmy Schuster, Charlie's dad.

"We had multiple people come up to us after he passed, and they were like, 'he was the first person to welcome me,'" the father added. "... He made an impact on a handful of kids with their journey and being new to the school."

Among those "kids" was Landon Kennedy, who came from Memphis "about three years ago" and met Charlie in school.

"Charlie was super inclusive," she said. "I didn't have too many friends and I was a quiet girl. But Charlie, I met up with him for the first time and we started becoming really close friends — and he started getting me out of my shell and even started taking me on some family trips and stuff like that."

Being honored

An employee at the Hardin Valley Food City for a few months, "Charlie Schuster was good young man with a bright future ahead of him — and he'd just turned 16," Joe Fahy, Hardin Valley Food City manager, said. "Charlie's parents raised some money in his honor (\$6,225) that they presented to us, and we will donate food to Cokesbury Church for their food bank. They plan on doing the fundraiser yearly and donating the proceeds in his honor."

Moreover, "We are also working with the state to adopt the road in front of the school(s) (HVA and Hardin Valley Elementary) and our location in his honor as well," Fahy added about that stretch of Hardin Valley Road.

"When he got his first job he loved it," Jimmy Schuster said about Food City, adding Charlie earned at least one raise "within those six months" of his employment. "He was learning quite a bit and his coworkers loved him."

Another fundraiser is the Third Annual Swider's Christmas Classic, a 501(c)(3) charity golf event "created to help others in our community through generous donations" according to a press release from host Avalon Country Club. While raising funds for Knoxville Amateur Hockey Association, "this year we are also raising money on behalf of the late Charlie Schuster," the release further stated. "... Partnering with Charlie's father, Jimmy, and Food City where Charlie worked, we will also be donating to The Connection Center's Fig Tree program and to the Charlie Schuster Scholarship Fund." The scholarship will award \$2,000 this school year.

Selfless Charlie

"I remember when he was about 11 years old and we were downtown in Knoxville, we had walked by a homeless guy and we just kept walking; but (Charlie) turned around, reached in his pocket and gave the man his only money, \$20, that he had on him," Jimmy Schuster said. "That's the giving person he was. A good way to say it is: 'he would just give you the shirt off his back.""

With Jimmy saying he "owned some rental properties," the father added that Charlie "was my right-hand man. ... He would always help me mow and work. He was a worker."

Much support

While echoing the father's memories, Charlie's mother sounded a note of gratefulness.

As for the outpouring of support since the accident, "The community has been nothing short of amazing," Leah Woods said. "They were here for us from the very moment of this tragedy. My friends, people that I knew, people that I didn't know."

That included "the baseball community — Charlie had been a baseball player since he was 3 years old," Charlie's mom said. "Our teams from the past, current teams; parents that we've met and known throughout his years of playing baseball have been there for us. They've all reached out to us. They've helped, they've supported. "Food City has been great to us," Woods added. "They have gone out of their way to just reach out and ask: 'Are you okay? What can we do?' They've been very, very supportive."

That list also includes "the school administrators — because we have two daughters (Audrie, a senior, and Addison, a fifth-grader) that are also in Hardin Valley schools — their teachers have been super kind and supportive and helpful.

"We can't say enough good things about Hardin Valley community and the way they have come together to help us and be supportive when we needed it most."

Blackberry picking & a lesson learned Grandson's touching tale of Grandma's green thumb

My grandmother was a green thumb; a kind of pre-Sierra Club "tree hugger." She spoke to her plants and her garden, and they grew bountifully.

She was "Appalachian," and she spoke the dialect. She also was a teacher. She went back to school at the University of Tennessee when she was 40, received her education degree and taught in Oak Ridge schools for 25 years.

When I was about 7 or 8, she took me blackberry picking, somewhere in Anderson County. It was an overgrown field with tons of wild flowers and plenty of blackberry bushes in the fence line. There were bees everywhere, and I was afraid I would get stung. She told me, "don't worry, they're busy collecting pollen. They won't sting unless you grab one by mistake so look before you pick."

We continued, but I was still very apprehensive, and she could tell. So out of the blue she said: "Let's lie down. I want to show you something." So, we did, but I wasn't very comfortable doing it. Lying on our backs in the field along the fence, I could see hundreds — or even thousands — of bees, grasshoppers, gnats, flies, butterflies, beetles, etc flying across the skyline between the flowers, plants, bushes and weeds. She proceeds to tell me that "all of these creatures have a purpose, and they all rely on one another. You do as well. They don't mind you being here so long as you respect them and what they are doing."

We laid there for a few minutes in silence after that, just watching, and I was calm. We got up and finished filling our bags. I may have picked up a few chiggers, so grandma insisted I shower when we got home. This day shaped my view of nature greatly and I am so grateful to have had it.

To this day, when given the opportunity, I will lay down in the grass or field and watch the insects fly around me and feel peace knowing the magnificence, beauty and purpose of all the living things that surround me. It's a cool thing.

Going back to its Valley roots

Net3IT managed IT services recently returned to its roots. The company moved from its Cedar Bluff office to 2575 Willow Point Way, Suite 109, off Hardin Valley Road.

"We are celebrating a business that literally started with one gentleman and then grew and grew and grew and now (the partners) are the proud owners of this whole building," said Julie Blaylock, Farragut West Knox Chamber of Commerce president/CEO, during a Chamber-sponsored ribbon cutting earlier this spring.

"It's really a blessing," said Jeff Scott, founder and one of three partners in Net3IT. "When we did our 10-year anniversary, we did a ribbon cutting for that milestone.

"We're also very grateful to our clients ... for your support and trusting us with your IT services," he added. "We are in a very unique position in how we help clients."

Net3IT is an IT consulting firm for businesses that also provides 24/7 monitoring services, network security protection, mediation services with vendors and help desk services.

Scott said he and his wife, Suzanne, started the business in 2012 "in the bedroom of our house with four young children under 14 ... we had a lot of faith in what we were trying to accomplish.

"We were able to help people in our careers, my career, especially in the IT world helping other companies," he added.

After moving the business out of their homes, "we actually rented a small office (in the building at Willow Point Way)," Scott recalled. "We just had one room."

At that time, the building's owners were John and Mitzi Platillero, who also owned the company Event Booking, and "were our very first clients," Scott said. "And when we bought this (Willow Point Way) building (in March), there were some leftover records, and my initial proposal was in a folder in there. Now, it's been framed."

Later, Net3IT moved from Hardin Valley to a business park in Cedar Bluff and operated there for a number of years and continued to grow, he said. He added Neal Arwood, who came on board as a partner in 2014, helping the Scotts convert the business to a managed IT services and voice-over IT phone services company. "We're focused on building a generational company, something we can hand down to the generations and keep that running," Scott said.

"What Jeff didn't tell you was in 2012, when he started this (business), he started it with the idea of it being a CIO consulting firm," Arwood said. "Ultimately, clients continued to ask us to keep things running. It was running good, and they asked, 'Can you keep it running?' So, we decided, 'yeah, maybe that's a good thing.""

like a guy who took a risk for him and his family," Arwood said. "And when I came in, I didn't have near the risk because he took care of me and my family to give us an opportunity to build.

Net3IT's move

"So, I'll be eternally grateful to Jeff for believing in me and for taking a risk," he added. "You can imagine, two headstrong guys ... but God has orchestrated a partner for me, has moved me back to center way more often than I would ever imagine I needed to move.

"(Scott's) the one who's been helping me try new things. I'm the one making sure he doesn't try too many new things."

Fast forwarding a number of years, "It's such a blessing to be part of this company today," Arwood said. "We are not only excited about the past; we're excited about the future."

In looking for a younger business partner, he found Patrick Hobbs, who joined as a partner in 2021.

"Patrick has brought another level of confidence, another 25 years of experience in IT management," Arwood said. "Of all the things Patrick brings to us, he brings shepherding to our staff. He's the kind of guy who can really understand what the needs of the people are, and he is a wonderful third and deciding vote between me and Jeff."

Recently, Scott said a Realtor friend asked him if he thought about buying a building.

"That night, I called my friend, John Platillero, and said, 'Hey, I hear you're trying to sell your building," Scott related. "The next morning, we came and looked at it (and) that night we had it bought."

Earn & Learn

More than just classroom to career

It's a good time for Pellissippi State Community College to celebrate its 50th anniversary.

One reason, among many, is "Earn and Learn," as told by a PSCC media release:

Yosef Erasmus always knew he wanted to work in the engineering field. But when he began exploring four-year degree programs, he was frustrated by the lack of hands-on learning opportunities. That all changed when he discovered Pellissippi State Community College's Earn and Learn program—an innovative pathway blending classroom instruction with real-world, paid work experiences.

"I heard about this program through Pellissippi, where I'd be learning engineering fundamentals while getting to apply them in the field," Erasmus said. "The chance to work with my hands and see how these concepts play out in real life — plus getting paid for it — was exactly what I needed."

Today, Erasmus is thriving as one of three students in the Earn and Learn's Electrical Engineering Technology initiative and one of two placed with Arconic Tennessee Operations. Over the past semester, he's been immersed in projects alongside seasoned Arconic electricians, running electric lines, testing fire alarms and touring the high-voltage yard that powers the entire plant.

The Earn and Learn initiative is more than just a classroom-to-career bridge — it's a launchpad for students eager to jump into industry with confidence and skills. Students currently in electrical engineering and water quality technology areas are reaping the benefits.

Under the Earn and Learn model, students balance two days of intensive classroom instruction with up to 25 hours a week of hands-on work in their chosen field. Industry partners such as Arconic, DENSO, Knoxville Utilities Board, Northeast Knox Utility District, South Blount County Utility District and West Knox Utility District are equipping students with invaluable skills while creating a direct pipeline to a skilled, ready-to-work talent pool.

"Employers are seeing the value firsthand," said Jon Gilbert, Pellissippi's Work-Based Learning manager. "They're investing in students right out of high school, shaping them into future employees who are already familiar with their systems and culture."

For companies such as KUB, the Earn and Learn program is a win-win. Business Analyst Dannon Dallmann has been instrumental in tailoring unique experiences for students.

"We really feel like it's an opportunity for us to give back to students," she said. "So, while they do have some administrative tasks, we're not trying to make them just work for their paycheck. It's more about giving them an experience, and it's rewarding to us to see people who are really interested and excited about working this hard."

Jay Easter, Arconic's Central Services Maintenance superintendent, agreed. He believes the partnership eases his company's introduction to those entering the workforce in electrical and mechanical trades.

Led by dual enrollment approach, PSCC is largest community college in state

For the last decade, Pellissippi State Community College has been the largest community college in the state, according to PSCC president Dr. Anthony Wise, who spoke to Rotary Club of Farragut members during a recent meeting in Fox Den Country Club.

Despite the challenges brought about by COVID, "We began to see enrollment start to move back forward four or five semesters ago, but a lot of that was related to the growth of dual enrollment," he said. "We had 3 percent enrollment increases, but it was almost all associated with dual enrollment."

Wise explained dual enrollment is the population of students who are enrolled in a local high school or home school and taking courses at PSCC and getting both high school and college credit.

He has seen strong growth in dual enrollment from students in Knox and Blount counties.

"In fact, dual enrollment students are about 24 percent of the student population at PSCC," Wise added.

On a personal note, "It's hard for me to believe I've been at Pellissippi State for 27 years," said Wise, who oversees the college's participation in KnoxAchieves, TNAchieves, Tennessee Promise and Tennessee Reconnect.

"We're looking to educate," Easter said. "And what we're giving students is an opportunity to see hands-on what happens when you get out here in the field in a large industrial environment."

Pellissippi State will expand Earn and Learn even further, aiming to add 12 more students across existing programs and creating partnerships with three new companies. Civil and Construction Engineering partnerships also are in development, offering even more diverse opportunities for the upcoming academic year.

For Mackenzie Watson, Earn and Learn has been a game-changer. After traveling to Zambia and witnessing the effects of poor water quality, she knew she wanted a career that could make a real difference. Through her placement with KUB, Watson has been able to dive deep into wastewater microbiology and the intricacies of water distribution.

She appreciates she's been able to "choose (my) own adventure," Watson said. "It gives me the opportunity to shadow where I want, to learn what I want and ask all the questions I have. I'm confident that it's setting me up for success ... and I have this team of people who are supporting me and encouraging me and my education and career goals."




