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

Louisiana in East Tennessee

Modeled after a historic plantation in Louisiana, Castleton Farms offers a unique, luxurious escape right here in scenic East Tennessee.

"The Castleton Manor – our house — came before Castleton Farms, and it was built in 1995," explained Danyelle McGrath, Castleton Farms Executive Director. "It's a replica of the Houmas House, and the lady that had it built just loved that mansion. So this is a smaller, downsized version of it, but they look pretty identical."

After purchasing the property in 2005, owners Dr. Meade and Kathleen Edmunds then turned Castleton Farms, 150 Cedar Grove Road, into a whimsical venue for weddings, corporate gatherings and other special events.

"It started out just primarily weddings, but now we do everything from group and corporate events to holiday parties," McGrath said, adding that all events provide access to the property's head chef, Robert Allen. "We have a private chef that used to be the executive chef at Citico's Restaurant at WindRiver... He's a phenomenal chef and he does all the food for us." Individuals and families can also book a room at the property. Weddings, however, continue to be the property's most popular venture, as Castleton Farms offers brides exclusive use of the grounds.


"We don't do multiple weddings or events, so they basically rent out the entire property," said McGrath, noting that Castleton Farms offers five different ceremony sites and two reception locations for brides to choose from. "One of the ceremony spots, probably the most popular one, is our vineyard. We grow muscadine grapes, and it's just a really popular spot."

Other ceremony sites include the Southern gardens and mystical woodland locations. For receptions, McGrath said the property offers a large open air pavilion or a restored equestrian barn. All locations can accommodate parties of up to about 350 guests.

"Our property is absolutely breathtaking, so people are blown away by all of these sites," she said.

In addition to its natural beauty, Castleton Farms also sets itself apart from similar properties by easing the planning process for brides.

"The service that we provide is definitely unlike most other places," said McGrath. "We do full wedding planning and design in house, and we walk couples through everything step-bystep... It's a real structured process."



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From budget planning to booking vendors, Castleton Farms' experienced team handles it all.

"We have a big planning experience day where we provide breakfast and lunch, and they get to come in, and all of their vendors meet them here on site," McGrath continued. "And it's just kind of a giant brainstorming session where we're able to kind of nail down all the details."

The team even helps unload and park vehicles on the weekend of the big day while guests enjoy cocktails, and takes care of all the set-up and decorating before the ceremony. Representatives are also onsite to assist in the bridal suite.

"We have four rooms that we can rent out overnight, so a lot of times the bride and the bridesmaids will stay Friday night, and then the bride and groom will stay Saturday night," McGrath said, adding that spa services are also available at the property. "We're really trying to position ourselves more as a destination where people can come out and just spend the whole weekend here."

The property, for example, is currently in the process of installing hiking and biking trails. Cabins may also be put in at a later date.

"We're trying to really revamp a lot of stuff," said McGrath. "We have 110 acres, so we have lots of room and have some really exciting things coming up."







Garner stays true to her roots

In every way, Missy Garner truly loves her community.

The Combat Quilter

Helping heal others and himself

After almost a decade spent quilting to keep his combat demons at bay, Andrew Lee, better known in some circles as "The Combat Quilter," is following God's direction to bring comfort and help others heal, too.

The 24-year U.S. Army veteran and Loudon County resident saw two tours of duty in Iraq in 2006 and 2009, and, once stateside, "tried many different ways to find comfort from his Post Traumatic Stress Disorder," he stated on his website.

"War causes many things we struggle with; fear of loud noises, difficulty sleeping, readjusting to normal life, and emotional numbness," he continued.

As almost a happenstance, he said, "I began quilting in 2016 after my ex-wife stated, 'We don't do enough together."

On his website he relates, "On a random afternoon, I found myself checking the mailbox to find a flyer for a quilted table runner class at a local quilt shop. After a shopping trip to buy more fabric, we met the husband and wife team that sew 'Quilts of Valor' and I was invited to join their male quilt group.

"After several evenings sewing with these fine gentlemen, I completed my first quilt [and] awarded my first Quilt of Valor to a 93-year-old World War II veteran."

He said this simple action "caused me to feel real, raw emo-

tion; the first time truly feeling something after returning home. I became addicted to being able to feel something; other than anger and frustration.

"I then became committed to the cause, and since then, have awarded more than 500 Quilts of Valor' and one to almost every family member.

"I have also quilted over 1,000 Quilts of valor that others

have made. I have awarded quilts all over the United States, sometimes in a parking lot, someone's home, or at some grand ceremony.

"Since the journey has begun, I have spent time traveling and teaching many things — Lonestar, pixel quilts, quilted jackets, and bags. I am still [long arm quilting] for customers, and quilting for Quilts of Valor.

"Now that I have my trademark and am still navigating the quilting community to see what it is that I can do to help be 'a light to the world,' I am still sharing my story in attempts to convince people to find a hobby that allows them to escape their demons and find some happiness; whether it be gardening, wood working, baking, drawing, painting, cooking, anything that you can physically touch afterwards, releases some magic chemicals in your brain to allow you to feel accomplished and happy.

"Science [shows us] it's impossible to be mad, and happy at the same time."

Lee, who remains a Tennessee National Guard member, said throughout his journey, "I have met so many amazing people along the way, and am attempting to find a way to help others deal with PTSD through finding an outlet and a new purpose.

"For the longest time, I felt God was sprinkling pebbles along the ground, saying, 'Follow me.' Then, one day in prayer He shared an image that showed these pebbles were the filler for the stepping stones he has laid for me.

"I hope my 'Shock and Awe' quilt pays tribute to all those veterans struggling, and see that a hobby of some sort will help. My "We Stand United" quilt is dedicated to all those first responders, fire fighters, police officers, paramedics, nurses, and doctors that continue to struggle with the things they see and feel on a daily basis.

Additionally, "I hope people feel inspired by my artwork, and find a way to help those still fighting the daily battle with their demons."

He finds camaraderie with fellow quilters, including the Village Quilters as well as two small groups, Quilts of Valor and The Divas + 1. "I am the +1," he said. He spends many weekends taking part in quilting shows, most recently attending one in Houston, Texas.

Lee also has a unique fabric line, offering a curated batik collection and he "designed a Patriotic cotton collection which ships to stores in December.

"I am also in the process of designing a third cotton line which is more neutrals and earth tones," he added.

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

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Longtime local staple acquires Meadow View, familiar faces remain

ongtime local staple Pope's Garden Center recently purchased Meadow View Greenhouse, taking over operations at 2858 U.S. Highway 11 in September.

"They had known owners Bob Washburn, Bob Pyle and Lisa Grugin from their years of working in the same industry," manager Amanda Insco said of the Pope family. "When Meadow View reached out to sell, they knew it would be the perfect, permanent location."

While the Lenoir City garden center is now owned by the Pope family, Insco, who's worked at Meadow View for the last seven years, said that all team members have remained through the transition.

"Customers should still see all the same friendly faces and expect the same knowledgeable staff," she said. "Our staff can answer disease/insect questions and give recommendations on what to plant and how to care for the plants. We also carry basic chemicals and fertilizers now."

Many Meadow View traditions will also remain, including the location's feline friends.

"The biggest Meadow View 'tradition' is our cats," Insco said. "All three cats have remained on staff, and they receive all the love and care they had before."

Pope's at Meadow View also plans to continue holding its annual Christmas Open House, which will be announced at a later date.

"We will still have the Christmas trees, poinsettias and holiday cactus as well," said Insco, noting that the greenhouse will be open and heated all throughout the winter. "After Christmas, we will have houseplants and other plants inside the greenhouse, so customers can still stop by and get their green therapy."

In the meantime, customers can enjoy Fall Fundays every weekend for the month of October, which will include face painting, pumpkin carving and pumpkin painting. Every Wednesday, the store will also have a "Wacky Wednesday" sale, along with regularly held "Scan and Save" sales.

Additionally, as a Pope's location, Meadow View now offers produce, most of which are grown locally at Greenback and Maryville farms.

"Right now we have over ten types of apples, onions, potatoes, cucumbers, okra and tomatoes," Insco said. "We also carry canned goods from Yoder's Country Market, an Amish Store in Bull's Gap, Tenn. We have lots of jams, jellies, pickles and pie fillings. We also carry local honey - both light (sourwood) and dark (wildflower)."

Pope's Garden Center first opened in Rockford in 1977. Along with the Meadow View location, the family-owned business also operates two other locations: Creekside, off Northshore Drive in Knoxville, Ginger's in Maryville.

"The Popes were very kind and gracious when they took over my 'baby'," noted Lisa Grugin, previous owner of Meadow View. "They kept my staff, which meant the world to me, and they asked for my input. I appreciate that very much and wish them well!"


Additionally, Pilot Club of Lenoir City supports the work of numerous other organizations that work to improve the quality of life in the community through volunteer efforts and/or contributions.

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New Year's Day

Local residents will again have the opportunity to immerse themselves in the icy waters of Tellico Lake while supporting a worthy cause during the East Tennessee Polar Plunge on New Year's Day.

A partnership of Visit Loudon County and Visit Monroe County, the annual event takes place each year on Tellico Lake, alternating between Loudon County and Monroe County boat ramps. This year, the event will be held at the Vonore Recreational Boat Ramp, 517 Fowler Street.

The county hosting the plunge also gets to select an area nonprofit to support. Last year, for example, the event at Poplar Springs Boat Ramp in Loudon raised more than \$1,500 for T-BART, a local organization that seeks to provide free boating assistance on Tellico Lake.

"We chose T-BART to receive the 2025 Polar Plunge proceeds due to their great work and service to provide safety for boaters on Tellico Lake," explained Blair Sitzlar, Director of Tourism and Marketing at Loudon County Chamber of Commerce, noting that Visit Monroe County will award a different nonprofit in 2026.

In addition to the cold water plunge, attendees will have the chance to visit a s'mores station, enjoy penguin photos and even participate in a costume contest. Plungers of all ages are welcome to attend; however, participants 17 and under must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Children 12 and under will also be required to wear a life jacket, Sitzlar said.

While registration will be available between 11 a.m. and 11:30 a.m. on the day of the Polar Plunge-Thursday, Jan. 1-Sitzlar added that signing up prior to the event will help ease the process.

"Registration in advance is encouraged to assist with T-shirt count and preparation," she said.

Polar Plunge tickets are on sale now for \$35 for adults and \$25 for children at the Loudon County Chamber of Commerce website. 100% of the proceeds will go toward the nonprofit selected by Visit Monroe County.



Oakland United Methodist Church



Filling the needs of a community

Each month Oakland United Methodist Church fills a need in the Greenback community by providing free clothing, shoes and linens. Held from 9 a.m. to noon on the first Saturday of every month, the shop allows those in nearby rural areas to access gently used items at no cost.

"Over three years ago, we had a vision of providing clothes in the rural areas where a lot of urban areas already have clothing and giveaways," explained Oakland United Methodist Church Pastor Betty Furches. "We're in a very rural area and when we started, we didn't know where we were going to get the clothes. We didn't know how we were going to store them, and we didn't know if anybody would come because we are out in the country and not on the main road."

Plenty of clothes, however, have been donated to the initiative over the years, allowing the church to even provide much-needed clothing for families in Asheville and Erwin following the devastating floods last year.

"We were led to keep pursuing the cause, and it has grown and grown and grown," said Furches. "Last Saturday, for example, we served 87 people in only three hours."

As part of the initiative, Furches said she also tries to help watch over any children to ease the shopping process for their parents and grandparents.


"I run a children's table and do a little lesson and have a craft for the children, so the mommies and the grandmothers can shop," she said, noting that the church strives to respect the privacy of all attendees, as well. "We don't ask your name. We don't have where you live or what your circumstances are... Just come in and get what you need."

While the next clothing drive is scheduled for Nov. 1, Furches added that anyone who has immediate needs can always make arrangements with the church.

"If someone needs clothes, like, if they've had a fire or a catastrophe, they can call and we'll meet them so they don't have to wait until the first of the month," she said.

Those interested in donating items can access a drop box at the church, located at 234 Trigonia Road, at any time.

"We just ask that the clothes be in bags, not just thrown in the drop box," said Furches. "And the drop box is available seven days a week, 24 hours a day."


